ROUND THE COUNTY RACE 2007

It seems every year we wish for enough wind to finish each segment of the Round the County Race before the daily time limit and yet not so much wind that carnage ensues. This year, Mother Nature threw a little of both at us. Friday was a blustery day as we made our way to Blakely Island Marina where we built a roaring fire and cooked our steaks and partied as only sailors can do. During the night, the wind howled, banging halyards and generally shaking the boats in their slips.

Saturday morning we awoke to gusty winds and sunshine. The race began at Lydia Shoal with about 15-20 knots of wind blowing from the Southwest. With this year's race traveling counter-clockwise around the islands, spinnakers were set for the start and the smaller boats were able to stay ahead (for a while) of the larger boats. Our good fortune was not to last as there were many "equalizer" holes in the wind to be found as we rounded the Eastern tip of Orcas Island and we soon had a huge cluster of boats complete with a tug pulling a barge traveling right through the middle. Everyone was looking for wind, trying to break away from the group. The wind began to fill again and we ended up with a beat for the rest of the day with most boats able to finish at Roche Harbor within the time limit. Hot showers and dinner were the order of the evening and then...more partying.

Sunday we awoke to gusty 12-15 knot winds with the forecast promising more wind to 30 knots later in the day. The wind was now out of the Southeast, so the first half of the race was a beat in building seas with the wind increasing to 20 knots. This segment saw a lot of upwind headsail changes as the wind continued to build. Stronger winds were in store as we rounded Cattle Point and we were whooping and hollering as we saw 15 knots of boat speed while surfing during a reach on Blackfoot under main and the #3 jib only. We finished at around 1430 in the

afternoon in 30-35 knots of wind and thus had daylight for most of the trip home. Not a lot of boats put up a spinnaker on Sunday afternoon and those that did provided the entertainment with some spectacular death rolls and broaches.

All Bellingham boats made it home safely even as the wind continued to rise. We recorded a peak gust of 48.6 knots on the way across Bellingham Bay where we were now surfing under storm jib only at speeds as high as 11 knots. Several Anacortes boats were not able to make headway through the wind and steep waves while attempting to return home and wisely opted to put in to Bellingham and wait out the storm.

Bellingham Yacht Club was well represented with **Jim Holstine** on *O' Ben Annas* finishing 5th in Division M, **Bob Diehl** on *Diehler* finishing 7th in Division X, **Marlene Bolster** on her *J-36* finishing 8th in Division O, **Jose Bartlett** on *Jamoca* finishing 4th and **Doug Nesbit** on *Yikes* finishing 13th in Division I, and **Mick Corcoran** on *Blackfoot* finishing 2nd and **Eric Yaremko** on *Flying Circus* finishing 10th in Division III. Congratulations to all and thanks to Orcas Island Yacht Club for putting on another great Round the County Race! Thanks also go to our Support Boats who make this regatta enjoyable not only through the pleasure of their company, but by providing a warm, dry haven, hot drinks and food and a bit of sanity! --- Comm. PIYA MEETING REPORT...

Saturday November 17th representatives from Seattle south to Victoria BC north joined together at the BYC for the Fall PIYA meeting. This is a sailing organization which encourages and fosters the development of sailboat racing across both the U.S. Pacific Northwest & B.C. Canada. PIYA assists in coordination of USSA area H & E racing activities to include area elimination events leading toward national U.S. Sailing Championships. They resolve racing protest appeals, provide race judging support & support the major area racing. PIYA maintains a standard set of safe sailboat racing by establishing equipment standards for various category's of sailboat racing. PIYA also provides sail numbers to PHRF boats of member clubs.

At the fall meeting changes in the category certificates were discussed and modifications made. Some of the big issues at the meeting were life line sizes & radar reflectors. Pay close attention to the certificates next year as we are currently updating for the 2008 season. You can download the certificates from the web page at www.ussailing.net/piya. On this site you can also link up to the racing schedules of clubs from Portland to B.C.

This year was the election of officers. I will be, for the next 2 years, the Vice Commodore with Chuck Ramsey Commodore and Jan Visser as Executive Secretary. I am also on the safety committee which works to keep the safety certificates up to date with the current designs and materials used in boat building.

I had another summer of boating, full of adventures and happenings!

This was Homie's year for boat issues. I've been fortunate over the years, and not had too many problems, but this was the year that Murphy decided to pay me a few visits. First, the circulating pump on the engine went out, then the memory battery in my chart-plotter, then an alternator and regulator. But the last issue happened with a guest aboard: the Vacu-flush toilet broke! Looking toward the future, in 2004 I had bought a toilet seat that fits on a five-gallon bucket, thinking someday this might come in handy, and it did; enough said.

Patty joined me in Vancouver May 23 and we got to enjoy that warm spell in late May up in Desolation Sound. Imagine being the only Boat anchored in Prideaux Haven, but that's what getting an early start provides! We cruised with **Sam Darbous** *S/V Alluvium* and another friend from the West Vancouver YC. Sam parted company with us after Prideaux Haven and went on up to Alaska. Now he's down in San Francisco where he'll be staying the winter. His plan is to go down to Mexico, then, who knows? He still flies the BYC burgee, and that can pay big dividends for reciprocals, he says.

Well, we continued on up to The Broughtons and had a great time. Patty jumped ship June 26th at Port McNeill, as she had some stuff to do with The Girls this summer, and I continued on up to Bella Bella/Shearwater area to hook up with friends that were up fishing. That's my new thing, trying to learn how to fish. I really did meet some nice folks along the way this summer, and learned a bit more about how to catch the critters. I'm looking forward to seeing them all again next summer.

Crabbing and prawning was quite good this year. Up at Ocean Falls a fella got a crab that was 11 inches! That's a Big Crab!!! The Store at Shearwater is much better than it was, and to do laundry there is still the most expensive place to be found --- we try getting that done at Alert Bay. I met some Locals at Alert Bay, and I'm looking forward to seeing them again next summer and doing some Halibut fishing in that area.

While anchored out at Port McNeill I did real well crabbing. Just put your pots out where everybody else does and you'll do fine. Also the Laudromat has free Internet.

On my return late July, I stopped by Duncanby Landing as Bob Hale wrote it up as being quite nice. At \$1.50/ft and \$30/nite/30amp, and the store not open, the place didn't appeal to "economy-minded" Capt. Homie, so I anchored in Goose Bay, and rowed ashore to see the old cannery. A group of firemen and policemen from Burnaby, BC bought the place four years ago and are fixing it up. They're not sure what they're going to do with it, and with 26 owners trying to agree on anything, it looks to be a bit of a challenge, eh? We did find a few new anchorages, but most of the time we spent at our Old Favorites. Patty joined me again in

Nanaimo August 10th and jumped ship September 10th at Friday Harbor. **Gary and Cheryl Parsons**, *M/V Dragonfly* joined up in late August in the Gulf Islands and we cruised together for five or six weeks. You can do that with certain folks, and they are great boaters.

After coming back to the States in early September, Gary and I came over to the Bellingham area and harvested some crab for him to take back to Rouge River, Ore. Even though Patty can't eat Crab, she can sure cook 'em, and we had some pretty spectacular meals. I still can't believe I actually lost 10 pounds this summer! Now the trick will be to keep it off.

If you can lay your hands on the August issue of Pacific Yachting, you'll have an even better understanding of what I was up against last summer. I've since found a new appreciation for Slack Current Predictions...

In order to get up to the Broughtons, you have to go thru at least one strong tidal-flow. But they all have slack current times, and I'm now a believer in hitting it at slack current! Last summer I was 1.5 hours late at Dent Rapids on a Spring Flood, heading south (not a good situation). As I was going thru, I got hit by a whirlpool that slammed my rudder hard to port and stuck the steering gear in that position, then I get caught in a big whirlpool that started spinning me around and I was still without steerage. Well, I figured it will just shoot me thru the rapids. Not!!! I got caught in a back-eddy. So now I was really "up to my ass in alligators and trying to figure out how to drain the swamp", as they say. After about two or three minutes of trying to just keep from hitting the shore, lots of forward and reverse, another whirlpool hit the rudder and knocked it loose.

I had to throw the shorts away that I was wearing, and for almost two weeks not a day went by that I didn't have a thought of what a horrific experience I had experienced.

Sooo, I learned my lesson: No more "Shooting the Rapids" for Captain Homie. It was a good thing that Mrs. Homie wasn't there to witness the event...

Now, in November, I have boat projects to do during the winter, and lots of crabbing until the end of the year, and figuring out how to get *Caroline* rigged for fishing next summer at St. Johns Bay up by Bella Bella and Shearwater.

I did meet a few BYC Boats this summer, and if I had my boat cards handy I'd be able to give them some ink. Maybe next time! And I was able to do a bit of recruiting for the Club during my travels. RBAW REPORT



The BYC is a supporting member of the Recreational Boating Association of Washington [as every individual member should be as well...Ed] and member BJ Ursin represents us at its meetings, and files the following report...

Mandatory Boater Education Card To date State Parks has issued over 8000 Boater Education Cards. *Don't forget:* All boaters 20 years and younger will be required to have a boater's education card with them when

operating a motor driven vessel (sail boat, power boat, jet ski) propelled by a motor of 15 horsepower or greater starting January 1, 2008.

Enhanced Washington State Drivers License Washington State is studying issuing an enhanced automobile drivers license that will be used in lieu of a passport. It is a national pilot program, and the plan is to extend the license to include boaters crossing the border. RBAW has a delegate at the State Department of Licensing, and we'll keep all Washington boaters informed of progress.

Boat Blue Coalition and NMMA - (US) H.R. 2550 & S. 2067 RBAW is continuing to work with the National Boating Federation (NBF) and the Boat Blue Coalition to support these two bills which would exempt recreational boats from commercial boat requirements requiring discharge permits for *any* water discharges from their boats such as bilge water, deck runoffs, cooling water, gray water, and others.

2008 Legislative Session RBAW has been meeting with Washington State officials in Olympia to consider options for new legislation for the upcoming Legislative session that starts in January. This legislation would include increasing the funding to the Boater Activity Account by diverting more of our boater excise tax in that direction.

The RBAW extends to all readers and boaters a happy and safe Holiday Season.
